- Living at the lake through February had some challenges. The coldest temperature was 3 degrees and keeping the cottage warm was difficult with no central heat or ceiling insulation. It required tending the wood stoves quite regularly, but living in an uninsulated home is not our long-term plan for living

- on the lake. As we experience the spring weather, we are awaiting the arrival of our new home via North Country Storage Barns.
- Our modular home was ordered 16 months ago and is now ready for delivery from New Holland, PA.

DEC NEWS

New York State recently passed a law making it unlawful for an individual to organize, sponsor, conduct, promote or participate in any contest, competition, tournament or derby with the objective of taking or hunting wildlife for prizes, inducements, or entertainment. The law specifically helps prevent the taking of significant numbers of animals (often coyotes, crows, squirrels, and rabbits) in contests held for prizes and entertainment. This law does not affect fishing or hunting as we now know it, and it will not affect our Bob Jennyjohn Memorial Fishing Derby.
